Human Rights Committe: How to guarantee the principle of non-discrimination and decrease the amount of national, racial and religious hatred?

Dear delegates,

The topic of this year's debates in Human Rights Comitee circles around hatred - hatred based on religion, race and one's nationality. My name is Kacper Westfal and this year I am honoured to perform the duties of a chairperson in this committee. My co-chair, Natalia Pietrzak and I will do our best to help all of you approach this most challenging topic.

After reading it, most of you more than likely think about hate-based groups based in more developed countries, like members of the European Union. And that is where you are wrong. Hate is not only restricted to the countries with heavy heritage of hate from back in-the-days or those with strong national identity. "'Racial Hatred' Cited After African Immigrants Are Shot in Italy". "How a Reporter and Victims' Families Went 'Beyond the Horror' of 2 Kansas Hate Crimes" "Hate crimes rose in 2016 - especially against Muslims and whites". But my task here is not to tell you what to think. The fact is that no matter your gender or the country you represent today, you should make a choice based on morals - not politics. I wish you all fruitful debates and good decisions. In times we live in, when we are more connected than ever before humans were the hate should not divide us.

Dear delegates, now it is your time to raise your voice and represent those, who cannot do it themselves. I am looking forward to meeting you all and hearing

your new, fresh ideas.
